Adopt-a-Highway and Trail Maintenance took place in May. We "own" a part of Rt. 214 North of Phoenicia and most of the trail that extends over Table and Peekamoose. Thanks to everyone who helped out with these projects, especially Cathy O'Neill and Phil Knudsen.

Several members of the club attended a gala/fund raiser for the Catskill Interpretive Center. Former Congressman Maurice Hinchey was honored for his unwavering efforts in promoting the project over many years. The club donated \$2,000.00 towards the construction of the new Center, to be located off Rt. 28 between Boiceville and Phoenicia. There might even be a fire tower erected on the site!

On National Trails Day, June 7th, a new Long Path segment was officially opened. The trail starts just past the junction that leads either to the Terrace Mountain lean-to or the Wittenberg's summit, as one ascends from Woodland Valley. Many club members helped create this new section of trail. I highly recommend checking it out, if for nothing else, the 'grand staircase' and the awesome views! Andy Garrison is the leader of this project.

Several members sent input to National Geographic to revise their Trails Illustrated Map #755 of the Catskill Park. The revised edition is due out this summer.

Several members attended the Catskill Park Awareness Day 2014, lobbying our legislators in Albany.

Finally, we have 2 new volunteers helping us out. Mike Dwyer is the new aspirant chair, and Bill Winterbottom is in a newly created leadership development position.

There are other activities mentioned in this issue of The Canister. I encourage you to pick something and get involved. Some of these could help you earn the Service Patch. You need 7 points. Here are the ways you can earn points:

Conservation Corner by Guest Columnist Heather Rolland

op quiz: how many of the Catskill 35 summits are on private land? If you said 3, you would have been right last week, but not this week. Yes, yes, we all know about Doubletop and Graham, but did you know that Balsam's summit was, until this month, also on land that was not owned by the state?

The summit of Balsam and much of the eastern-facing slope of the mountain are part of a 590 acre parcel that was purchased by the state, with the official transfer to state ownership occurring at a celebration and hike on May 20. The story of how this happened is a success story for the conservation community, with the result being a true winwin situation for all concerned (ok, that might be a winwin-win when you consider all the players involved!).

The Cruickshank family owned the land for generations, but in 2005 after a property tax reevaluation, began exploring ways to resolve the increased financial burden. Logging the property was given serious consideration due to the valuable stands of sugar maple, red oak and hemlock. Alan White, at that time Director of the Catskill Program for The Nature Conservancy in Eastern New York (and currently Executive Director of the Catskill Center for Conservation and Development), asked the Cruickshanks to hold off. The landowners waited for the Conservancy to come up with a plan for purchasing this parcel that accounted for the value of the timber as well as the value of the acreage. Win for the landowner family! The parcel was not logged and the Nature Conservancy took ownership. Win for conservation! Then the negotiations between the Conservancy and New York State began. Almost a decade in the making, a \$1.65 million deal was reached and another summit becomes forever wild. Win for the 3500 Club!

Rambles and Brambles: Hike Schedule July—September 2014

Assumed Risk: Hiking involves certain inherent risks and persons participating do so at their own risk. In cool weather, hike participants should avoid cotton clothing, as it retains dampness and the resulting chill can result in hypothermia, which can lead to death. In summer participants should have available in their pack garments of wool or fleece and a headlamp, should one have to unexpectedly spend the night in the mountains. Anyone not properly equipped may be refused permission to participate, at the leader's absolute discretion.

Rating System: Please be advised that the hikes listed herein would most likely be rated more difficult by clubs who hike in non-mountainous terrains

Private Property: All Catskill 3500 Club hikes respect "No Trespassing" signs and the owners' wishes in such regards; leaders shall obtain permission to cross private property when so required.

Volunteer to Lead: If you are a member of the Club please consider becoming a hike leader. Just contact Manuel Peraza [outings@catskill-3500-club.org; 718-698-4422 (7 p.m.-9 p.m.)], and he will arrange to add you to the low-volume private Yahoo list through which hikes are coordinated. You will be contacted via this means when hikes are needed.

Group Size: All Club hikes are limited to 12 participants including the leaders. The DEC limits group size to 12 in the Wilderness Areas. Accordingly, all Club hikes allow no more than 12 participants. If in doubt, please contact the leader.

Larry Braun, of Gardiner, NY, passed away November 21, 2013 of congestive heart failure.

Born in 1933 in Brooklyn, Larry moved to Gardiner to retire in 1995.

Over the years, Larry led numerous hikes in the Shawangunks, Catskills and Adirondacks for the ADK, as well as international hiking trips to Ireland and St. John, Virgin Islands. He was an early life member of the Catskill Mountain 3500 Club, the Adirondack Mountain Club, and was active in the New York/New Jersey Trail Conference. He was a trail maintainer in the Gunks. He loved the outdoors, and was a keen observer of nature, and got great pleasure from sharing his knowledge and experience of the outdoors with others. Many a hiker has been spared from toe jams by using Larry's special bootlacing method.

His home reflected his respect for nature, where he installed solar panels, and built a grass driveway to better preserve water. It was his pleasure to watch the birds, deer, harrier hawk and other wild life right from his living room window, which had a great view of the Shawangunk Ridge. Larry was also a communitarian, believing strongly in protecting the earth and all living creatures.


In the Hudson Valley, Larry fulfilled a lifelong dream of flying; he loved viewing our Shawangunk Ridge and trails from above. He learned to ski when in his sixties, and then joined the Seventy Plus Ski Club. He liked to say that since hiking up mountains had become more difficult

it was great to let the ski lift bring him up the mountain and gravity bring him back down.

Larry lived and appreciated life to the fullest, sharing his joy in hiking and outdoors with others. He is survived by two sons and their families, a twin brother, niece, and loving significant other.

A celebration of Larry's life was held in New Paltz, at Rosendale Recreation Center on Saturday April 26th.

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
