Conservation Corner

A Note from our Conservation Chair, Carol White

Fund has provided vital funding for land and water conservation water conservation projects, outdoor recreation access, and the preservation of historic and other landmarks.

LWCF is paid for with non-taxpayer dollars. A small portion of revenues from offshore oil and gas drilling goes to outdoor recreation and conservation, as an offset for the depletion of resources that belong to us all. LWCF's authorizing legislation expired on Sept. 30, 2015. Urge your Senator to sign onto <u>S.338</u> and <u>S.890</u>.

S.338 would permanently reauthorize the LWCF and S.890 would provide full, dedicated and permanent funding of \$900 million annually to the *Land and Water Conservation Fund* as authorized by Congress, and finally fulfill the promise that was made to the American people 50 years ago. **Urge your Congressperson to sign onto H.R.1814**, a companion bill to S. 338 to permanently reauthorize the *Land and Water Conservation Fund*. Please ask your Senators and Congressperson to cosponsor these bills and thank them if they have.

Region 3:

our weeks on the upper portion of the McKinley Hollow Trail finishing up work from the previous season. 38 rock steps, 211 square feet of scree along the edges of the staircase, and two rock waterbars containing 14 rocks total.

Three weeks on the Cornell-Wittenberg Trail high above Woodland Valley campground. 58 rocks steps, 43 stepping stones, 376 square feet of scree, and one rock waterbar containing 3 rocks. A 45 square foot rock turnpike was also constructed that contains over 20 rocks.

Region 4:

One week was spent on the north side of Elm Ridge installing half mile of multi-use trail.

A crew worked at Kaaterskill Falls for 18 weeks implementing a new plan to provide access to the middle pool. Over 200 rock steps measuring 8 inches x 16 inches x 4 feet and weighing over 700 lbs. were transported via a series of highlines over 1300 feet. 100 rock steps were installed and a benched trail was created to the pool by chiseling into the bedrock. The crew will be returning to finish this project in 2016. — Wes Lampman, Adirondack Mountain Club, North Country Operations Director (Note: Photos for this article are in the digital version of the Catskill Canister—Ed.)

Our speaker for 2016's Annual Dinner meeting will be Evan Pritchard with a talk entitled: *Closer to Paradise* — Viewing The High Peaks of the Catskills From an Indigenous Standpoint: Native American Lore and Story About The Catskill Mountains

In this talk, Evan Pritchard will share with us Algonquian Indian beliefs and stories about mountains, touching specifically on the rich indigenous history of some of the high peaks that endow the Catskills with such grandeur. The Esopus Munsee were the main group that inhabited the high peaks, and saw them as places of great spiritual power, to be saved for spiritual retreat and renewal. They

Rambles and Brambles: Hike Schedule January — March 2016

Assumed Risk: Hiking involves certain inherent risks and persons participating do so at their own risk. In cold weather hike participants should avoid cotton clothing, as it retains dampness and the resulting chill can result in hypothermia, *which can lead to death*. Instead, wear (and have available in your pack) garments of wool or fleece. Silk or polypropylene make the best base layers, as they tend to wick moisture away from the body. Hats, gloves and a headlamp must be part of the standard winter kit. Ice and snow can come early and unexpectedly to these peaks. *Each hiker must bring snowshoes and full crampons to the trailhead;* the leader may advise that these do not have to be taken on the hike, but be aware that while there may be bare ground at the trailhead, there is often very significant ice and snow as the elevation increases, which could result in those improperly prepared being sent back. Anyone not properly equipped may be refused permission to participate, at the leader's absolute discretion. *Winter in the Catskills is not to be treated lightly.*

Rating System: Please be advised that the hikes listed herein would most likely be rated more difficult by clubs who hike in non-mountainous terrains

Private Property: All Catskill 3500 Club hikes respect "No Trespassing" signs and the owners' wishes in such regards; leaders shall obtain permission to cross private property when so required.

Volunteer to Lead: If you are a member of the Club please consider becoming a hike leader. Just contact Bill Winterbottom: <u>outings@</u> <u>catskill-3500-club.org</u>; 973-222-1077 (7 p.m.-9 p.m.)], and he will arrange to add you to the low-volume private Yahoo list through which hikes are coordinated. You will be contacted via this means when hikes are needed.

Group Size: All Club hikes are limited to 12 participants including the leaders. The DEC limits group size to 12 in the Wilderness Areas. Accordingly, all Club hikes allow no more than 12 participants. If in doubt, please contact the leader.

Evan Pritchard, a descendant of the Mi'kmaq people, is the Director of the Center for Algonquin Culture located near Shawangunk Ridge and the author of over 30 books, including *Native New Yorkers, No Word for Time, Native American Stories of the Sacred, Henry Hudson and the Algonquins*, and *Bird Medicine*, to name a few.

The Annual 3500 Club Winter Weekend Is January 22-24, 2016!

t's that time of year again, when we pull out the MICROspikes® and snowshoes and start thinking about winter sports in the Catskills.

The Catskills 3500 Club is proud to announce Winter Weekend will be January 22-24, 2016. As in the past few years, we will once again be at the Frost Valley YMCA — a great setting not only for hiking, but also for cross-country skiing for those staying on site. There are three housing options available: the Friendship House which is inn-like housing, rooms with two twin beds and private baths, the <u>Castle</u> which has private rooms but shared baths, and <u>Biscuit Brook Lodge</u>, a large cabin with bunks. It has a central meeting space with a fireplace (perfect after a day of playing in the snow!).

During the weekend, there will be hikes led by experienced hike leaders to some of the easier peaks but also to the more challenging ones for those new to winter hiking or more experienced outdoors people. This includes hikes being led to all four required winter peaks, so if you are looking to finish up the winter hikes, why not do it during this two fun-filled days in the beautiful Catskills.

Costs are \$298 per room for the Friendship House and \$256 per room for the Castle, which includes both nights and is priced based on the room, double or single occupancy. Biscuit Brook is \$40 for a bunk for the weekend and has configurations of 4 or 6 bunks to a room.

In addition to the housing costs, everyone pays \$90 for meals (Friday night light snack through Sunday lunch). Once registered, meal expenses will be refunded up to one week before the event, but housing costs will be returned only if there is a waiting list.


